WILLY T. RIBBS DOMINATES BUDWEISER TRANS-AM® CHAMPIONSHIP EVENT AT BRAINERD

BRAINERD, Minn. -- The domination of the 1983 Sports Car Club of America Budweiser Trans-Am $_{\odot}$  continued Sunday at Brainerd International Raceway as Willy T. Ribbs picked off the third-straight DeAtley/Budweiser team victory and also won for the third time this season.

Ribbs, who also won at Portland and Mid-Ohio, was the quickest qualifier of the weekend as he rounded the three-mile track in a time of 1:37.953, 110.257 mph, a record. That was just one of 11 qualifying times that bettered the 1982 mark set by Elliott Forbes-Robinson, a time of 1:40.540.

The 27-year-old black driver from San Jose, Calif., had little trouble in reaching the winner's circle. He jumped ahead at the start and teammate David Hobbs, who has accounted for three victories as well this season, fell in right behind as the red-and-white Camaros paced the pack.

Ribbs managed to build on his lead as the rest of the top 10 began to battle with longtime SCCA National standout, Jerry Hansen. Hansen, running on his home course and also racing in three other categories on the weekend, picked his way through the field and quickly vacated his ninth starting position. By lap 22, Hansen had moved up to third place and was beginning a push to overtake Hobbs.

His charge was aided by a yellow flag, which came out for a three-lap period on lap 24 when oil was dumped at the entrance of turn 10. That yellow closed the lead Ribbs held over both Hobbs and Hansen to just over three seconds and that threesome raced to the last lap in that order until Hansen spun off course at turn nine trying to pass Hobbs. He ended up ninth.

Tom Gloy is stuck on third-place finishes as he ended up in that position for the sixth-straight race. The Mercury Capri driver finished ahead of defending series champion and fourth place finisher Elliott Forbes-Robinson, in his STP Son of a Gun Trans-Am. Fifth place went to Paul DePirro in his U.S. Electric Camaro. For the Lombard, Ill., driver, it was his best finish in his short Trans-Am career.

The best finish by a foreign make Sunday went to Paul Newman who finished 24th in his Datsun 280ZX Turbo.

The points chase remains a three-way race after eight events with Hobbs holding a 122-102 lead over Gloy and Ribbs is third at 84. Elliott Forbes-Robinson is fourth at 73 and Gene Felton is fifth at 59 points.

The next round of the 1983 series is scheduled for September 4 when the series makes it's final Eastern appearance at Trois-Rivieres, Quebec, Canada.
